SUBJECT: The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Sacramento District, (Corps) is evaluating a permit application to construct the Murphy Glen Estates project, which would result in impacts to approximately 4.532 acres of waters of the United States, including wetlands. This project is within the North Vineyard Station Specific Plan area. This notice is to inform interested parties of the proposed activity and to solicit comments. AUTHORITY: This application is being evaluated under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act for the discharge of dredged or fill material in waters of the United States.

LOCATION: The project site is located south of Florin Road and east of Bradshaw Road, in Section 4, Township 7 North, Range 6 East, Sacramento County, California, and can be seen on the Elk Grove USGS Topographic Quadrangle.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION: The Murphy Glen Estates project is part of the North Vineyard Station Specific Plan, which encompasses approximately 1,590 acres of the Vineyard Community Plan Area. The applicant is proposing to construct a residential community on a 40-acre parcel which involves approximately 30 acres (100 units) of low-density single-family residential units and 10 acres of multi-family residential units. Based on the available information, the overall project purpose is to construct a residential development within the Sacramento County Urban Services Boundary. The attached drawings provide additional project details.

As proposed, construction of the residential development would cause the permanent loss of all waters of the U.S. on site. All vernal pools and the drainage swale delineated have been identified as potential habitat for the Federally threatened vernal pool fairy shrimp (*Branchinecta lynchi*) and endangered vernal pool tadpole shrimp (*Lepidurus packardii*). Also, Federally endangered Sacramento orcutt grass (*Orcuttia viscida*), threatened slender orcutt grass (*Orcuttia tenuis*), and threatened California tiger salamander (*Ambystoma californiense*) may potentially occur on this site.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION:

Environmental Setting. There are approximately 2.122 acres of vernal pools, 1.336 acres of seasonal wetlands, and 1.071 acres of seasonal wetland swales (4.532 total acres of waters of the U.S.) within the project area that have been verified by this office. The site is primarily characterized by annual grassland with scattered seasonal wetland features.

There is currently undeveloped pasture and rural residential properties located adjacent the project area.

Alternatives. The applicant has provided information concerning project alternatives. Four alternatives were considered in their analysis.

1) No Project Alternative: This would result in the property remaining in its current state with no impact to any waters of the U.S. However, current aquatic features would continue to be degraded due to ongoing agricultural practices such as discing and tilling. This alternative was rejected by the applicant since it does not meet the project purpose of providing residential housing.

2) No Fill Alternative: This alternative consists of preserving approximately 27 acres of the project area. This would result in no impacts to any waters of the U.S., and would include an upland buffer area of 100-feet around all waters of the U.S. The applicant has determined that this alternative would not be economically practicable.

3) 20.8-Acre On-Site Preserve: This alternative would consist of preserving 20.8 acres on the eastern portion of the site. A total of 3.189 acres of waters of the U.S. and adjacent 100-foot upland buffers would be protected. The applicant has determined that this alternative would not be economically practicable.

4) 4.2-Acre On-Site Preserve: This alternative would consist of preserving a 4.2-acre area which includes approximately 0.63 acres of vernal pools (including 100-foot adjacent upland buffers) in the northeast corner of the project area. This would result in approximately 36 acres of area to be developed. The applicant rejected this alternative since the preserved wetlands would most likely be cut off from their hydrological sources and continue to be tilled and disced, further degrading their functional integrity.

The applicant has not provided a list of other parcels considered where their project could be constructed which would cause fewer impacts to aquatic resources.

Additional information concerning project alternatives may be available from the applicant or their agent (ECORP Consulting, Inc.). Other alternatives may develop during the review process for this permit application. All reasonable project alternatives, in particular those which may be less damaging to the aquatic environment, will be considered.

Mitigation. The Corps requires that applicants consider and use all reasonable and practical measures to avoid and minimize impacts to aquatic resources. If the applicant is unable to avoid or minimize all impacts, the Corps may require compensatory mitigation. The applicant has proposed to create vernal pool, seasonal wetland, and seasonal wetland swales at a 1:1 ratio at an off-site Corps-approved mitigation facility. Preservation credits have also been proposed to be purchased for impacts to vernal pool and seasonal wetland at a 2:1 ratio at a Corps-approved mitigation facility. However, preservation credits have not been proposed to be purchased for impacts to seasonal wetland swales.

OTHER GOVERNMENTAL AUTHORIZATIONS: Water quality certification or a waiver, as required under Section 401 of the Clean Water Act from the Central Valley Regional Water Quality Control Board, is required for this project. The applicant has indicated they have applied for certification.

HISTORIC PROPERTIES: A cultural resources field survey of the property has been requested by the Corps. The Corps will initiate consultation with the State Historic Preservation Officer under Section 106 of the National Preservation Act, as appropriate.

ENDANGERED SPECIES: The proposed activity may affect Federally-listed endangered or threatened species or their critical habitat. The Corps have initiated consultation with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, pursuant to Section 7 of the Endangered Species Act, for potential impacts to Federally threatened vernal pool fairy shrimp (*Branchinecta lynchi*), endangered vernal pool tadpole shrimp

(*Lepidurus packardi*), endangered Sacramento orcutt grass (*Orcuttia viscida*), threatened slender orcutt grass (*Orcuttia tenuis*), and threatened California tiger salamander (*Ambystoma californiense*).

ESSENTIAL FISH HABITAT: The proposed project will not adversely affect Essential Fish Habitat (EFH) as defined in the Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act.

The above determinations are based on information provided by the applicant and our preliminary review.

EVALUATION FACTORS: The decision whether to issue a permit will be based on an evaluation of the probable impacts, including cumulative impacts, of the described activity on the public interest. That decision will reflect the national concern for both protection and utilization of important resources. The benefit, which reasonably may be expected to accrue from the described activity, must be balanced against its reasonably foreseeable detriments. All factors which may be relevant to the described activity will be considered, including the cumulative effects thereof; among those are conservation, economics, aesthetics, general environmental concerns, wetlands, historic properties, fish and wildlife values, flood hazards, floodplain values, land use, navigation, shoreline erosion and accretion, recreation, water supply and conservation, water quality, energy needs, safety, food and fiber production, mineral needs, consideration of property ownership and, in general, the needs and welfare of the people. The activity's impact on the public interest will include application of the Section 404(b)(1) guidelines promulgated by the Administrator, Environmental Protection Agency (40 CFR Part 230).

The Corps is soliciting comments from the public, Federal, State, and local agencies and officials, Indian tribes, and other interested parties in order to consider and evaluate the impacts of this proposed activity. Any comments received will be considered by the Corps to determine whether to issue, modify, condition, or deny a permit for this proposal. To make this decision, comments are used to assess impacts on endangered species, historic properties, water quality, general environmental effects, and other public interest factors listed above. Comments are used in the preparation of an Environmental Assessment and/or an Environmental Impact Statement pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act. Comments are also used to determine the need for a public hearing and to determine the overall public interest of the proposed activity.

Please note that all comment letters received are subject to release to the public through the Freedom of Information Act.
