TYPES OF PERMITS – OVERVIEW INDIVIDUAL PERMITS

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U.S.ARMY

INDIVIDUAL PERMITS 325.5(B)

- Standard Permits and Letters of Permission (LOPs)
- Activities that cannot be authorized under a General Permit
- May have more than minimal individual or cumulative environmental impacts
- Case-by-case evaluation of proposed project
- Determination that the proposed project is not contrary to the public interest







INDIVIDUAL PERMITS



Letter of Permission (LOP)

- Not controversial
- Minor individual or cumulative impacts
- No public notice (agency notice instead)
- Public interest review and 404(b)(1)
 Alternatives Analysis
- Categorically excluded from NEPA
- Abbreviated coordination and documentation
- Projects that don't qualify for GP

Standard Permit

- Complex, can be controversial
- Potential for substantial environmental impacts
- Requires public notice, public interest review, NEPA compliance (EA/EIS) and 404(b)(1) Alternatives Analysis
- Full public interest review
- Projects that don't qualify for GP or LOP




STANDARD PERMIT PROCESS



- Pre-application meeting with USACE
- Submittal of Permit Application (ENG Form 4345)
- Public Notice issued (public, adjacent landowners, interest groups, local agencies, state agencies, and Federal agencies)
- Public Notice comment period (15 to 30 days)
- Substantive comments provided to Applicant
- Applicant response to comments
- Request for additional information (if necessary)
- Any modifications needed to project to reduce environmental impacts
- Corps considers all comments and responses
- A public hearing/meeting is held (if necessary)
- Evaluate Scope of Analysis, mitigation, related laws
- Public Interest Review evaluation
- Section 404(b)(1) guidelines evaluation (if necessary)
- Corps makes a final decision







COMPLETE APPLICATION



- Signed Application Form (ENG Form 4345)
- Complete description of the proposed activity
- Purpose and Need
- Scheduling of Activity
- Names and Addresses of Adjoining Property Owners
- Locations and Dimensions of Adjacent Structures
- List of authorizations required by other agencies
- Compensatory Mitigation Plan



Information not required for complete application but necessary for issuance

- Endangered Species information
- Cultural Resources information
- Alternatives for EPA's Section 404(b)(1) Guidelines compliance
- Site Photographs



PUBLIC INTEREST REVIEW



- 1. Conservation

PROJECT PURPOSE & ALTERNATIVES



- Considers applicant's needs and type of project being proposed
- Specific enough to define needs, but not so restrictive as to constrain the range of alternatives considered
- Used to identify and evaluate practicable alternatives

Compliance with NEPA and US EPA's Section 404(b)(1) Guidelines (Section 404) "To restore and maintain the **chemical**, **physical**, **and biological** integrity of waters of the United States through the control of discharges of dredged and fill material." 40 CFR Section 230

AVOIDANCE - MINIMIZATION - COMPENSATION

- Practicable alternatives should include no action alternative and consideration of off-site and onsite alternatives
- Evaluate alternatives for water dependency, cost, existing technology, and logistics



PERMIT DECISION

To be authorized, Corps must find the activity:

- Complies with other related laws, including ESA and NHPA
- Is not contrary to the public interest
- Is the least environmentally damaging alternative (compliance with 404(b)(1) Guidelines)
- Complies with NEPA
